
Dear Parents:

The Importance of Vaccinations

One of the most important conversations you can have with your child's pediatrician or family practitioner is about the importance of immunizations. Just a sample of immunizations to discuss with your child's doctor are: diphtheria, pertussis, haemophilus influenza (Hib), hepatitis A and B, polio, measles, mumps, rubella, varicella (chicken pox), pneumococcal conjugate (PCV7) and tetanus vaccines. Vaccines protect children against these diseases by activating the antibodies that will protect them in the event of exposure. Some are single dose, while others are given in a series. Your child's pediatrician will advise you of the schedule for these important inoculations.

Some vaccinations are required before your child may enter daycare or kindergarten, while others are merely recommended. Your child's pediatrician will advise you of the most current requirements and recommendations. He or she will also provide a vaccine record form that you will bring to each appointment, as well as daycare, pre-school or school registration.

Regular Check-Ups and Boosters are Important

It is important to maintain an ongoing record of your child's immunizations and check-ups until the age of 18. Some vaccines require booster shots at scheduled intervals, in order for your child to maintain immunity. Again, your child's pediatrician is an expert when it comes to recommendations and requirements.

- Reduces your chances of developing cancer, lung disease, heart disease, stroke, dental and other health problems
- Protects your children from cigarette smoke

Quitting Tips:

- Stay busy
- Keep your hands busy
- Relieve stress by exercising
- Use oral substitutes like carrots, pickles and sugarless gum
- Drink plenty of water
- Avoid alcohol because it increases the chance that you will give in to tobacco cravings
- Buy yourself something with the money you save for NOT buying cigarettes
- Be positive
- Take on day at a time
- Use relaxation techniques
- Ask friends and family to help

If you are not ready to quit smoking, protect your children. Keep them away from cigarette smoke.

Smoking in the car with a child under six (6) years of age is against the law.



Important Note: All documents presented to obtain a Library Card must include your current address.

- 1. Be a Garland or Saline County Resident
- 2. Verify CURRENT address using one of the following document types:
 - a. Arkansas Driver's License or Arkansas I.D card—which includes your name and current address.
 - b. Local Utility Bill—which includes your name and current address.
 - c. Bank Checkbook—which includes your preprinted name and current address.
 - d. Garland County Tax Receipt (Real Estate or Personal) or Assessment— (must be official document) which is filed for the previous calendar year.

Library Card Application Requirements — Children & Young Adults

A parent or legal guardian must accompany the applicant (ages 5-14), and the parent's identification will be used to verify residential address and social security number.

Arkansas Child Passenger Protection Law

- A driver can be stopped and issued a ticket for not having a child in the proper child safety seat or seat belt. Fines range from \$25 to \$100 per child.


