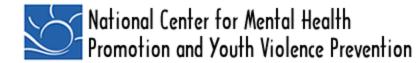
Family Engagement Framework

Traditional Engagement (Epstein's)	Non Traditional Engagement
Parenting	Develops reciprocal understanding of schools and families
Communicating	Situates cultural strengths of family and community within the school curriculum
Volunteering	Provides parental education that includes family literacy and understanding of school community

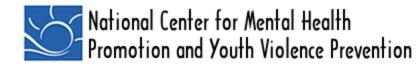
Family Engagement Framework

Traditional Engagement (Epstein's)	Non Traditional Engagement
Learning at Home	Promotes parental advocacy that informs and teaches parents how to advocate for their children
Decision Making	Instills parental empowerment through parent-initiated efforts at the school and community level
Collaborating with the Community	Implements culturally and linguistically appropriate practices in all aspects of communication

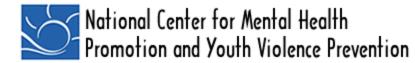
Why Involve Parents?

- Parents are key influencers with:

- What is your message and how will you deliver it?



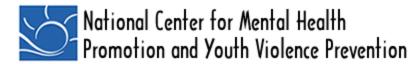
Tips and Ideas for Outreach

- Coordinate a family event or workshop.
- Enlist teachers and school staff members.
- Use multiple channels to communicate.
- Ensure materials are culturally competent.
- Develop partnerships with local organizations.
- Promote programs through school activities with high parental involvement.



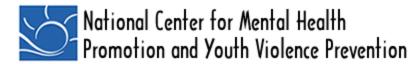
Tips and Ideas for Active Participation

- Create opportunities for parents to give feedback.
- Enlist parents to develop communication materials.
- Establish a group of parent leaders to attract new parents.
- Identify parent champions to engage with school leaders and policymakers.
- Thank and acknowledge parent volunteers.



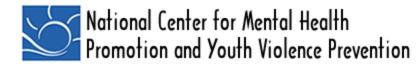
