What Is Bullying?

"Bullying is when someone repeatedly and on purpose says or does mean or hurtful things to another person who has a hard time defending himself or herself."

Three Key Components of Bullying Behavior

- 1. Involves an aggressive behavior
- 2. Typically involves a pattern of behavior repeated over time
- 3. Involves an imbalance of power or strength







Why is it important to address bullying in schools?

- 1. For students and their futures
- 2. For a healthy school climate
- 3. For the larger community
- 4. For the purposes of risk management for schools









Effects of Being Bullied

- Lower self-esteem
- Depression and anxiety
- Absenteeism and lowered school achievement
- Thoughts of suicide
- Illness







Concerns about Children Who Bully

Children who bully are more likely to:

- get into frequent fights
- be injured in a fight
- steal or vandalize property
- drink alcohol and smoke cigarettes
- be truant or drop out of school
- report poor academic achievement
- perceive a negative climate at school
- carry a weapon







Effects of Bullying on Bystanders

Bystanders may feel:

- Afraid
- Powerless to change the situation
- Guilty for not acting
- A diminished empathy for victims over time







Effects of Bullying on School Climate

- Bullying creates a climate of fear and disrespect.
- Bullying interferes with student learning.
- Students may feel insecure and not like school as well.
- Students may perceive a lack of control or caring.





Misdirections in Bullying Prevention and Intervention


- Simple, short-term solutions
- "Program du jour" approaches
- Group treatment for children who bully
- Anger management or self-esteem enhancement for children who bully
- Zero-tolerance policies for bullying
- Mediation/conflict resolution to resolve bullying issues
- Selecting inappropriate supplemental materials





Schoolwide Guide with DVD and CD-ROM




- 134 pages with DVD/CD-ROM




Program Principles

- 1. Adults in school need to show warmth, positive interest, and involvement.
- 2. Set firm limits for unacceptable behavior.
- 3. Consistently use nonphysical, nonhostile negative consequences when rules are broken.
- 4. Adults in the school should act as authorities and positive role models.





What Roles Do Students Play in Bullying Situations?





School-Level Components

- 1. Establish a Bullying Prevention Coordinating Committee (BPCC)
- 2. Conduct committee and staff trainings
- 3. Administer the Olweus Bullying Questionnaire
- 4. Hold staff discussion groups
- 5. Introduce the school rules about bullying
- 6. Review and refine the school's supervisory system
- 7. Hold a school kick-off event to launch the program
- 8. Involve parents







School Rules about Bullying

- We will not bully others.
- We will try to help students who are bullied.
- We will try to include students who are left out.
- If we know that somebody is being bullied, we will tell an adult at school and an adult at home.





Classroom-Level Components



- Post and enforce schoolwide rules against bullying
- Hold regular class meetings
- Hold meetings with students' parents







Common Bullying Locations

48% Hallways / stairwells

32% In class (with teacher absent)

29% In gym class/locker rooms

27% In class (with teacher present)

24% In lunchroom

17% In the bathroom

15% On the bus

16% On way to and from school

8% At the bus stop







Individual-Level Components

- Supervise students' activities
- Ensure that all staff members intervene on the spot when bullying occurs
- Hold meetings with students involved in bullying
- Develop individual intervention plans for involved students if bullying doesn't stop after meeting











Community-Level Components



- Involve community members on the BPCC
- Develop partnerships with community members to support your program
- Help spread anti-bullying messages and principles of best practice throughout the community



















- •Addresses bullying on school buses








Address Cyber bullying

OBPP Training Information

- Training is highly recommended for successful program implementation
- Option 1: Contract with an outside Olweus Trainer
- Option 2: Have a member of your school trained as an Olweus Trainer







OBPP Training Information www.clemson.edu

- Training provided by certified Olweus trainer
- Two-day training for committee members and consultation for at least one school year
- Committee conducts one-day staff training
- School is mentored for 12 months with monthly phone or in-person meetings
- Sustainability—new staff and administration training each year

- Advantageous to find person close to your school for cost effectiveness and convenience in consultation







Training Costs to Bring in a Certified Olweus Trainer

- Varies widely from \$0 to \$3,000 for two schools – 2 day training
- Consultation \$0 to \$1,200 per school







Cost of a Trainer if the Trainer is in your School or District

- Available for multiple schools as a part of their job; Training for multiple years; Available for Staff Training
- \$4,200 for TOT Tuition
- Travel Costs for Two Trips:
 - TOT Part 1
 - TOT Part 2








Take-Home Message

- It requires a long-term commitment.











