Alhambra Unified School District

- Predominately lower income and immigrant families
- Ethnic Breakdown:
 - 53% Asian, 40% Hispanic, 1% African American, and 9% Caucasian and others
- 70% of students reside in low-income homes
- 70%-81% of students receive free and reduced lunch
- Title I eligibility is 100%
- Economically disadvantaged children face a higher number of risk factors





Need for Services

- •57% increase in juvenile crime in Alhambra from 2005 to 2007
- 2006-2007 academic year: 1,783 suspension/expulsions
 - Over 1/3 of these disciplinary actions originated at the elementary level
- •55% of 5th, 78% of 7th, 89% of 9th and 91% 11th graders reported not feeling safe at school
- Early intervention and prevention increase academic, social and emotional functioning at school.





Implementation

- •Second Step Small Groups will be offered to students exhibiting at risk behavior
 - K-5th graders exhibiting high risk behavior are referred by Mental Health Integration Team (MHIT)
- ^{3rd} graders enrolled in the after school program will participate in *Second Step small groups* after school

Challenges

- Funding Crisis
 - Significant community risk factors and limited service availability at AUSD have been recently compounded by poor economic trends.
 - Circumstances in California are dire
 - Elimination of all counseling positions at the elementary level this school year





Challenges

- A continuum of curricula, activities, programs and services implemented district wide, incorporating community, families, and partnering agencies is needed to integrate services in school environment
- New programs integrated into school curriculum adds responsibilities to school staff
- Successful integration requires buy-in from school staff





Outcomes

- **Objective:** The number of students suspended/expelled for violence related incidents will decrease by 10% from 2007/2008 baseline. (Measurement: District database-Power School)
- **2**007/2008: 519 students were suspended/expelled for violence related incidents.
- •2008/2009, 393 students were suspended/expelled for violent related incidents.
 - A one group, pre-post test design is utilized to present the percentage of students suspended/expelled for violence related incidents and the percent change from pretest to posttests.
- The result reveals a 24.28% decrease from baseline.





Outcomes

- •Objective: The number of students suspended/expelled for violence/harassment will decrease by 5% at the elementary level (Measurement: District database-Power School).
- **2**007/2008: 278 elementary students were suspended/expelled for violence.
- 2008/2009, 163 students elementary students suspended expelled for violence/harassment.
 - A one group, pre-post test design was utilized to present the percentage of students suspended/expelled for violence related incidents at the elementary level and the percent change from pretest to posttest.
- These results reveal a 41.37% decrease from baseline











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
