During this session Karen Dorsey, Federal Project Officer with the U.S. Department of Education, referred to a page on the Department's website that will provide a link to all Department of Education <u>Federal Register</u> notices. You should look for the following types of notices:

Notice of Proposed Priority(ties) - allows the public to comment on substantive focus of newly proposed or revised grant programs/funding opportunities. Notices related to grant programs/funding opportunities include the proposed priority area(s); eligibility and other requirements; and definitions. If selection criteria other than those established in EDGAR [Section 75.210] will be used for a new grant program, proposed selection criteria will also be included in this notice. This document is available for review and comment usually for 30 days.

Notice of Final Priority(ties)* - official release of priorities or requirements for a grant program after public comment has been received, considered, and sometimes incorporated into the final version of the grant program/funding opportunity.

Notice Inviting Applicants* - announces the start of a grant competition, providing information on how to obtain an application and the application submission deadline, as well as contact information for Department staff who can answer questions about the grant competition.

*For the Department of Education these two notices are generally published on the same day if the program is new or has been substantially revised. The application is also available electronically on that same date.

TIP: Sign up to receive the <u>Federal Register</u>'s Table of Contents via email at <u>www.gpoaccess.gov/fr</u> and review each day. All Federal agencies are required to publish information regarding proposed funding opportunities as well as proposed regulatory changes in the <u>Federal Register</u>.
