Meeting the Needs of All Students and Bolstering School Climate Using School-Wide, Evidence-Based Programs

As SS/HS grantees strive to meet the needs of all students, they are faced with challenges to effectively plan, coordinate, and implement school-wide evidence-based programs and practices at all levels of the pyramid that effectively address student needs and are a good fit within the systems, bolster the school climate, and result in partners' commitments to reach desired outcomes. One grantee will share her experience with implementation of school-wide PBIS in the pyramid's three zones as well as additional programs to address student needs, including steps they are taking to ensure that there is buy-in and ownership to fidelity and full implementation, that students are matched to appropriate programs based on risk and need, and that evaluation data are used to determine whether outcomes are being achieved.

Financing School Mental Health Programs and Services
